

Important information regarding the coronavirus (COVID-19) and its impact on our parish community

Please note: As we continue to monitor the coronavirus, these directives may be modified. Please visit our website, stmarysbville.org, for the most up-to-date information.

Bishop Lucia announced that all Masses and other liturgical services have been cancelled until further notice. That means that we will not be having daily Mass, Adoration, Stations of the Cross or Weekend Masses.

NEW The church will be open for private prayer from 12:00pm - 3:00pm on Saturday and Sunday. Entrance to the Church will be available through the North door only (across from the Rectory). Please practice social distancing while visiting the Church (minimum of 6 feet of space between individuals).

NEW The Parish Office will be closed to visitors. Please call the Parish Office during the hours of 10:00am - 4:00pm Monday - Thursday at 315-635-5762 for Mass Intentions or to set up an appointment for confessions or anointing.

All parish programs are cancelled for the time being. This includes Scripture Study, No Greater Love Program, Fish Fry, and Men's Basketball.

Living Stations of the Cross and all Youth Ministry events have been cancelled.

Faith Formation classes, including First Eucharist and Confirmation Preparation and Workshops are cancelled until further notice. If you have questions regarding Faith Formation, please contact Mrs. Mackey at cmackey@syrdio.org.

During this time, our school will be closed to the public. There will be no entry permitted to the school building until further notice.

Reflection

We are in the midst of a pandemic. People are frightened, anxious, confused and dismayed. We are navigating waters that have never been traversed and that is anxiety provoking. However, Jesus tells us, "Be not afraid." How can we not be? This is some seriously scary stuff! How can we make it through this, not just physically, but mentally?

There is a Fred Rogers quote going around that says, "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping.'" That is exactly what has always worked for me. I search for people who calm the storms, as Christ did, by a hand outreached, a hand that helps others. And this is what I have seen so far:

My graduate school professor from Rome, Italy has been sharing videos of Italians on their balconies. They go out at the same time each evening and sing and dance, eat their dinners, and pass the time cheering each other up with all of this. They are showing love and unity, while staying safe and obeying the Italian guidelines for the virus.

I have read about a woman who gave up a carton of eggs at the grocery store so that another person could have one. As a gesture of thanks, unbeknownst to the woman, the woman who received the eggs gave the cashier a \$100 bill to pay for the woman's groceries.

I have heard of a man who left a \$2500 tip at a restaurant, knowing that they would be closing at 8:00pm and the staff would now be out of work. He asked for them to split it among them.

I just got a phone call from an employee at my mom's nursing home who said she heard that I missed my mom, am heartsick about not being able to see her and that I wanted to FaceTime with her. So, she had my mom FaceTime with me. I was overjoyed and overcome by this gesture! And here's the crazy part: I never told anyone that I wanted to FaceTime my mom. I didn't even know it was a possibility.

In all of these things, God's hand is at work. I talk about this all the time with my students; angels among us that are doing God's work. We talk about how in times of chaos and crisis, God always raises up people to be the good against the evil. St. Teresa of Calcutta said, "we can do small things with great love." So, are you doing something small, yet extraordinary? Can you help to end someone's nightmare of fear? Can you calm someone's storm? I know this for sure; great joy is had by serving others. It is through doing for others and bringing them solace that peace comes to your heart. During this time of great fear and uncertainty, remember the One that comforts the scared, never abandons, and conquers the demons. And strive to be like Him. It will not just make you feel better, it will make the other person feel better, as well. Nothing can defeat the human heart that is filled with our Lord. Peace be with you.

Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen"
